Isle Royale is the U.S.'s least visited, and most revisited National Park. While serious situations can occur in this remote wilderness, almost anyone who wants to, can plan and execute a safe and enjoyable Isle Royale kayaking experience. I'll be your guide, with tips on planning, navigation, and packing.

Isle Royale, easily accessible from Michigan, is the least visited, and most revisited U. S. National Park. It is a world where waves pulse against a hundred feet of vertical

basalt. Where cliffs are studded with delicate carnivorous butterwort and sundew, nodding purple harebells. Where waves surge over underwater ridges and swirl through a secret arch. Along with its pleasures, however, Isle Royale's weather spins on a dime. Serious situations can occur anywhere: on the water, at the dock, on landing, on launching, or on a hiking trail. Its remoteness amplifies potential consequences of injury or illness.

Almost anyone who wants to, however, can plan and execute a safe and enjoyable Isle Royale kayaking experience. I'll be your guide, with tips on planning, navigation, and packing, along with Isle Royale's human and geologic history. You'll learn how to move out of your comfort zone and into an adventure that is right for you.
